April 13, 2021 PAS lecture series: Although Spanish West Florida during the late 17th-18th centuries has been studied fairly extensively by both historians and archaeologists, the city of Pensacola during the twilight years of Spanish colonial rule is one of the least researched periods in Florida's long Pre-Jacksonian history. Characterized as the most culturally and racially heterogeneous city in Florida until the second half of the twentieth century, society and circumstances in Pensacola during this "Second Spanish" period (1783-1821) were dramatically different from those shaping earlier centuries of colonial rule. In this presentation, Mullins will discuss Pensacola's diverse social milieu for this time period, as well as historical and archaeological research on the Spanish West Florida families who shaped the cultural, economic, and physical characteristics of what many of us unconsciously recognize today as *uniquely Pensacola*.

Deborah is an archaeologist by training and obsession. A "GatorNaut" hybrid, Mullins took her B.A. in Anthropology from UF and her M.A. in Historical Archaeology from UWF. Aside from innumerable laughs, sunburns, and archaeological surveys across the Southeast, Mullins has led research projects on colonial era sites in Florida, especially in and around New Smyrna Beach, St. Augustine, and Pensacola. Mullins has also been part of research projects focused on the pre-Columbian Lucayan and Taino cultures of the Bahamas, the Turks and Caicos, Puerto Rico, and Haiti, and a mixed bag of colonial era Spanish and British sites across the Caribbean and Veracruz, Mexico. Most recently, Mullins worked with UWF President Emeritus and Archaeologist Judith Bense on her forthcoming book detailing the presidio communities of Spanish West Florida. Deborah lives (her way) in Pensacola, Florida with her amazing family and her abiding love of all things dusty, rusty, and underground.

### CALL FOR PAPERS AND POSTERS

The Florida Anthropological Society invites the submission of abstracts for paper and poster presentations at the 73rd annual meeting and virtual conference. We encourage submissions on a broad range of topics pertaining to Florida anthropology, archaeology, history, and other related disciplines. Presentations will occur on Saturday, May 22, 2021. An abstract of no more than 100 words is required from each paper or poster presenter.

- Individuals may submit only one paper or poster as first author for consideration.
- All presenters must be FAS members and should register and pay the appropriate registration fee at the time they submit their abstract.
- A 20-minute time limit for each paper presentation will be strictly enforced.

Poster presenters must submit a PDF copy of their poster by May 1, 2021, so conference attendees can view it virtually prior to the conference.
