About our March program and speakers:

This month's program is a favorite with PAS members and UWF students every year. For a number of years this program is the lead in to what students can expect during their UWF field schools this summer. We also get to hear about the artifacts recovered and conclusions about the features found on the Luna settlement site or new targets that showed interesting characteristics from paths run in Pensacola Bay last summer. Maybe they have found another shipwreck.

Our speakers need no real introduction, but here are some reminders about their interests and previous work in and around the bay.

Dr. Greg Cook, associate professor of Anthropology, teaches shipwreck archaeology, maritime archaeological field methods and archaeological field survey. Dr. Cook is a maritime archaeologist who is very interested in historic shipwrecks. As co-principal investigator of the Emanuel Point II shipwreck in Pensacola Bay, he leads a team of students in surveying and conducting underwater excavations on the second vessel from the Tristan de Luna's 1559 colonization fleet. Dr. Cook specializes in remote sensing techniques and uses advanced sonar equipment to map out the location of objects on the seafloor.

Dr. John Worth, professor of Anthropology, teaches historical archaeology, historical research methods, Southeastern Indians, and field and laboratory methods in archaeology. One of the foremost experts on Spanish colonial history, he is the principal site investigator for the archaeological site of the Tristán de Luna settlement – the oldest established multi-year European settlement in the United States – that was discovered in a developed neighborhood in Pensacola in 2015. Dr. Worth, an ethnohistorian who has spent 25 years working with original Spanish documents, has written three noteworthy books that intertwine research with historical and archaeological investigations.
